In 2005, Amsterdam University Press launched the Amsterdam Academic Archive (AAA), bringing important scholarly out of print titles back into print and making them available to an international reading audience. As well as a paper edition, each title will be also available digitally.

AUP has four editorial advisory councils, consisting of prominent and knowledgeable Dutch and Belgian scholars, judge all publications based on their academic standards.


